

Hygiene Tips for Mental Mellness

AIR PLANT Care

Air Plants, also known as Tillandsia, are some of the easiest plants to care for – but they do require some care and proper environmental considerations to thrive. While they are called "air plants" as they do not require soil and take their nutrients from the air, they still need water,



Environment

The first thing to consider when determining air plant care is your environment. It is critical that you consider your environment when determining things like watering method and frequency. If your home is drier, you might need to water more frequently or mist daily in between soaks, whereas if your air plants are in a place where they receive abundant humidity from the air, you may need to water less.

Air Plant Species

There are species of Tillandsia, all unique in shape, size, growth patterns, and care preferences. While some air plant care tips will apply to the majority of Tillandsia, it's important to consider the air plant itself. In general, silverleaved plants and those with a higher concentration of trichomes will do better with more light and less water, whereas the darker green plants will want more water and could be more susceptible to sun damage.

Light

One of the most important things any living creature needs is light, and air plants are no exception. If you are keeping your plants indoors, you will want to make sure that they are near an adequate light source. This can be within 3-5 feet of a window, or near an artificial light source. Take care to not let your air plants get too much direct sun, as this can be harmful, even in an indoor environment. If you are keeping your plants outside, make sure they are in a shaded area that does not receive full sun. There are only a few varieties that can handle direct sun.

Air plants love being placed in a bathroom or kitchen window (indirect light), and the steam/moisture will keep them happy! Artificial light can also be a sufficient source if the plants are not too far from the light and receive adequate amounts per day.



nutrients, and light to survive. Air Plants are technically epiphytes, meaning that they grow in nature on another tree, host, or object. However, they do not steal nutrients from their host, only using it as a home to grow on. Air plants use tiny vessels located throughout their leaves called trichomes to capture nutrients and moisture from the air.

Because they do not require soil (and most Tillandsia should NOT be planted in soil), it allows them to thrive in a wide range of settings and spaces. This flexibility of growth allows air plants to be used in a variety of scenarios which has led to increased popularity of Tillandsia as decorations for homes and offices.

Watering

- As a general rule, soak your plants once a week for 30 minutes to an hour. You can use a bowl, a bucket, or your sink, just make sure that the plants can be completely submerged
- Rain or pond water is best, but you can use tap water as well. It is recommended letting tap water sit out so that the chemicals can dissipate before you water your plants. Do not use distilled or softened water to soak your plants
- After soaking, lightly shake out an excess water and set them out on a towel to dry so their leaves are facing down. Allow them to dry completely before adding them back to their terrarium, holder, planter. Etc. Excess water left in their leaves can cause them to rot
- Soaking at least once a week will ensure that air plants stay happy, healthy, and thrive!

Other Fun Ways to Use & Display Air Plants at Home

Air plant containers are not limited to glass globes or grapevine wreaths, albeit fun, there are other great ways to show off these fascinating plants.

Any container can be used to display air plants as containers function as an aesthetic partner for an air plant, but there are a few points to consider when choosing a container:

- Metal containers should be avoided because they oxidize and harm an air plant
- A container needs to be shallow enough that its sides do not block the bulk of the plants light
- Use dry material (moss, rocks, sand, etc.) to fill deeper containers so that the air plant is elevate above the container's sides
